Best Practices

Keep these best practices in mind as you develop your FIP:

- For comprehensive FIPs, an entity experienced in applying the MSC Fisheries Standard must conduct or audit/review the MSC pre-assessment and develop the scoping document.
- 2. For basic FIPs, it is recommended, though not required, that an independent third party conducts the needs assessment.
- 3. If the scoping document is very detailed, it is recommended to create a summarized version before sharing it with stakeholders.
- 4. Throughout the FIP development process, it is important to translate materials into the local language used by stakeholders and to adapt the materials to local situations. This will increase understanding and support of the FIP.
